Dear Parents,

Below you will find a list of suggested books and authors for your child to read over the summer. Each child should read for at least fifteen minutes every day. You should be reading to your child, as well as, allowing your child to practice reading to you. Within this packet, you will be provided with a calendar for each month of summer where you and your child can record the amount of time read each day. The goal is to read every day to avoid any sort of regression over the summer months.

In addition to keeping a reading log, each child is expected to complete two graphic organizers that are also included in this packet. The first is to be filled out using a fiction story. It will identify different story elements, as well as, tell what happened at the beginning, middle, and end of any story they choose. The second organizer is to be filled out using a nonfiction/informational text. On the back of each graphic organizer, your child should illustrate a picture to go along with the book they have read using as much detail as possible. Please help your child to complete each of these before returning to school. Reading daily and completing these organizers to distinguish between different books and their elements will only benefit and prepare your child for the many things he/she will be learning in First Grade.

Also, each child should spend at least fifteen minutes weekly on the computer program IXL. IXL is a fabulous math site for students to keep up their knowledge on different skills from addition to subtraction to money to time. They should be working within the kindergarten standards and can do whatever strands they want based on their academic needs. IXL will report to me weekly on who works on what strands and for how long. Each student within the school is given their own student id and password and will use this through the 8th grade. If you do not have your child's id and password for this site, please contact the school for this information.

The summer reading packet will be collected on the first day of school and I will be checking IXL weekly. Enjoy your summer and happy learning! Laugh, play, relax, and READ! I look forward to seeing and meeting you all for the 2017-2018 school year!

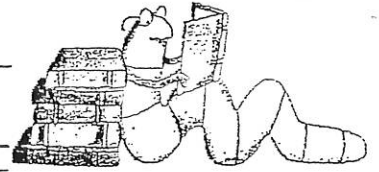
