MATH

American Revolution Chapter Books

My Brother Sam is Dead by James Lincoln Collier - A family divided by war. Tim Meeker has always looked up to his brother Sam, who has now joined the American Revolution. His parents support King George. Tim has some tough choices to make.

Moon of Two Dark Horses by Sally M. Keehn – This book takes a look at the Revolutionary War from the Native Indian perspective. Coshmoo and Daniel have been best friends as long as the Delaware Indians and white settlers have lived peacefully along the Susquehanna River. Will the Revolutionary War change this?

The Winter of Red Snow: The Revolutionary War Diary of Abigail Jane Stewart, Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, 1777 (Dear America) by Kristiana Gregory - 11-year-old Abigail Jane Stewart's fictionalized diary about her life, family, friends, and neighbors, and the sides they have to choose in Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, during the height of the Revolutionary War.

My Name Is America: The Journal of William Thomas Emerson, A Revolutionary War Patriot by Barry Denenberg - In 1774, 12-year-old orphan Will is befriended by Mr. Wilson, who secretly works with a group of rebels against the British. This book is written as a series of journal entries from the point of view of a boy living at the time of the Revolutionary War.

Chains & Forge by Laurie Halse Anderson - About slaves during Colonial America. ***Forge*** is about runaway slaves during the American Revolution. ***Chains*** is the first book, told from the perspective of one character, Isabel. ***Forge*** is the second book, told from the perspective of another character, Curzon.

Friends of Liberty by Bernice Gormley – *This book* takes the reader right to the Boston Tea Party, but does not include it. The focus is really on the friendship between the two girls and the affect that outside forces beyond their control have on this friendship.

The Secret Soldier: The Story of Deborah Sampson by Ann McGovern. Deborah longs for a life of adventure, and since this is forbidden most females, Deborah gets the bright idea to enlist in the Continental Army – but how can she do that?

Hope's Crossing by Joan Elizabeth Goodman – The story of a 13-year-old kidnapped slave and her fight to make it back home to her family.

Johnny Tremain by Ester Forbes - Johnny Tremain is fourteen and apprenticed to a silversmith. Will Johnny become a master silversmith, or will the war (or something else) get in the way? (Note: Slightly higher reading level, 5-6 grade)

The Revolutionary War: An Interactive History Adventure by Elizabeth Raum – YOU live in the America colonies in the late 1700s. In this book, you make the same choice people made back then, creating a different story with each different choice.

Eighteen Roses Red: A Young Girl's Heroic Mission in the Revolutionary War by Ruth H. Maxwell – The American Revolution is tearing apart Anne's family, and now a Rebel soldier with a message for George Washington lies near death in her house! Will she deliver the message?

Attack of the Turtle by Drew Carlson – Fourteen-year old Nathan Wade agrees to help his cousin launch his invention of a water machine that can explode bombs underwater against the British warships in New York harbor.

The Arrow Over the Door by James Watling – Samuel Russell is a 14-year old Quaker. Stands Straight is a young Abenaki Indian. The Revolutionary war put these two in contact with each other with interesting results.

An Eye for an Eye: A Story of the Revolutionary War by Peter and Connie Roop – Samantha Byrd is an excellent hunter, providing food for her family. With the Revolutionary War approaching, she questions whether she could ever raise her weapon against a person.

Felicity's Boxed Set (American Girl Collection) by Valerie Tripp - The American Girl Doll books are wonderful for girls ages 7 and up. Felicity is a fictionalized American girl in colonial Williamsburg from 1774 to 1776.

My America: Five Smooth Stones: Hope's Diary, Philadelphia, 1776 Book One, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania 1776 by Kristiana Gregory - As tensions rise between the Tories and Patriots in 1776, Hope's life becomes more and more confusing. She wonders if she will ever see Papa again. Her brother Ethan has proclaimed that he is a Tory and has left home. Will the Revolutionary War keep them apart forever?

My America: We Are Patriots, Hope's Revolutionary War Diary, Book Two by Kristiana Gregory - In this wonderful second book featuring Hope Penny Potter, the Revolutionary War wages on and Hope's daily life is affected. The war has even kept her from her dear friend, Polly, whose parents are loyal to the King. But when Hope's brother and father return, relief sets in, if only for a short while. The plot thickens when Hope finds out that her father was with the Sons of Liberty and her family will be in danger if anyone finds out.

My America: When Freedom Comes, Hope's Revolutionary War Diary, Book Three, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, 1778 by Kristiana Gregory - Hope describes the realities of life in Pennsylvania as she is caught up in the Revolutionary War. Though the nation's future is still uncertain, Hope remains optimistic and brave. For the last time, Hope records in her diary the turmoil of life under British occupation in colonial Philadelphia during the Revolutionary War.

An Enemy Among Them by Deborah H. Deford - Margaret must test her loyalty and courage when a wounded prisoner of war is brought into her Pennsylvania home in this novel of the Revolutionary era.

***The Fighting Ground* by Avi, illustrated by Ellen Thompson** - He may be just thirteen, but Jonathan knows he's ready to go to the war against the British. He can handle a gun. He yearns to battle for glory, just like his brother and cousin. So when Jonathan hears the tavern bell toll, calling men to fight, he runs to join them. He doesn't realize that in just twenty-four hours, his life will be forever altered— by the war, by his fellow soldiers, and by the terrible choices he must make.

***Toliver's Secret* by Esther Wood Brady** - When her grandfather is injured, 10-year-old Ellen Toliver replaces him on a top-secret patriotic mission. Disguised as a boy, she manages to smuggle a message to General George Washington.

***Maria's Story, 1773* by Joan Lowery Nixon** - In Williamsburg, Virginia, two years before the start of the American Revolution, nine-year-old Maria worries that her mother will lose her contract to publish official reports and announcements of the British government because she prints anti-British articles in their family-run newspaper.

***One Dead Spy* by Nathan Hale** - Nathan Hale, the author's historical namesake, was America's first spy, a Revolutionary War hero who famously said "I regret that I have but one life to give for my country" before being hanged by the British. In the Nathan Hale's Hazardous Tales series, author Nathan Hale channels his namesake to present history's roughest, toughest, and craziest stories in the graphic novel format.

***Midnight Rider* by Joan Hiatt Harlow** - Fourteen-year-old Hannah is an orphan living with her cruel aunt Phoebe in Salem, Massachusetts. Hannah recently lost her mother, and now her only comfort is her horse, Promise. But when her money-hungry aunt sells the horse and then indentures Hannah to the Boston family of a British general, Hannah vows to retrieve Promise at all costs, and join the fight for freedom.

***Guns for General Washington: A Story of the American Revolution* by Seymour Reit** - Seymour Reit re-creates the true story of Will Knox, a nineteen-year-old boy who undertook the daring and dangerous task of transporting 183 cannons from New York's Fort Ticonderoga to Boston--in the dead of winter--to help George Washington win an important battle.

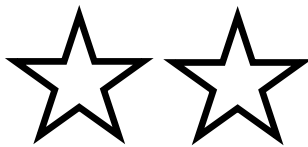

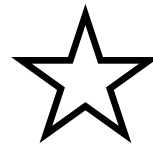
